I am so thrilled to be performing in my first appearance at Soulpepper in Where The Blood Mixes, co-produced with Native Earth Performing Arts. I have been a big fan of Kevin Loring, and this play for quite some time. We have all gone through quite a lot over the past couple years with the pandemic, but Kevin and his people, the Nlaka'pamux, were also extremely impacted by the devastating wildfires in BC that nearly destroyed his entire community, followed by flooding. They are survivors in spite of years of colonial oppression, the residential school system, the 60s scoop, and other destructive government policies. I love this play because it is a story of survival, rebirth, reconnection, and reuniting. The characters are funny, and tough, hardened, but loving. Kevin allows us to look deep below the surface of his community and see all the darkness and murkiness with humour, love, and a strong will that allows them to re-immerge from the sacred waters' depths with new knowledge, and the rediscovery of ancestral knowledge to continue moving forward. In the spirit of reconciliation, you being here tonight helps to honour and support the Nlaka'pamux, and other Indigenous people through the resurgence of their stories being heard.

About Kapapamahchakwew: Kapapamahchakwew - Wandering Spirit School was founded in 1977 on the vision of Pauline Shirt and Vern Harper who were look for a safer school for their own child. Wandering Spirit Survival School was designated as an alternative school before being recognized by the TDSB as a Cultural Survival/Native Way program in 1983. The vision of the school is to empower future leaders with a strong cultural identity to be contributing members in a global society.

Where the Blood Mixes was commissioned and first produced by Western Canada Theatre, Savage Society and The Playhouse Theatre. Its World Premiere was at Luminato Festival, followed by the Western Canada Premiere at the Magnetic North Theatre Festival, in 2008.

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BACKGROUND NOTES

Remember... when we were kids... I do. I remember everything.

Stories are the heart of life. Stories can be entertainment or medicine; they can illuminate the past or light the way forward. Playwright Kevin Loring tells this story to 'expose the shadows and celebrate the survivors.'

Loring believes we are where we are from, so the setting is his home community, Kumsheen (also called Lytton), Interior Salish territory in B.C., where the Fraser and Thompson rivers merge. In the N'laka'pamux language, the word 'kumsheen' refers to this confluence. Its literal translation is the place inside the heart where the blood mixes.

The story revolves around old friends Floyd and Mooch, who are alternately hilariously funny and haunted by memories. Creating the characters, said Loring, was like unwrapping an onion layer by layer to 'strip away the stereotypes and get to the heart of why these guys are the way they are... The more I unravelled that onion... I got down to... that invisible demon that... no one was talking about, and no one wanted to talk about.'

The demon is St. George's Residential School and the long echoes of the community's individual and collective experience there. As Mooch says, 'Don't matter how long ago it was. It happened yesterday, it happened today, it'll happen tomorrow. Every day is every day.'

Our past is also where we come from. Part of Mooch's past is still present in his fiercely protective wife, June, and Floyd's is due to arrive in the form of his long-lost daughter, Christine. Other presences include the voices of lost children, the running salmon, the osprey floating on the wind, and the mighty sturgeon that haunts the depths of the water. N'laka'pamux believe sturgeon bridges the spirit world and the land of the living.

Indigenous dramaturgy, according to Loring, unfolds like ripples in a pond. Laugh by laugh, story by story we go deeper into these lives, and they engage us more and more by the heart. Loring says '... people can become ghosts, hanging on to their old pain ... Until they let go, they can't grow.'

Thank you for being present to witness, to hear the story.

You gotta talk about it though. That's the thing, eh? You gotta talk about what happened.

Playwright Biography:

Kevin Loring is N'laka'pamux from Lytton First Nation, B.C. An accomplished actor and director, Where the Blood Mixes was his first play. It premiered in 2008, won a Governor General's Award in 2009, and toured across Canada in 2010. Recent plays include Battle of the Birds and The Boy Who Was Abandoned, as well as Songs of the Land, a project that explores songs and stories of the N'laka'pamux in partnership with 5 organizations in his home community. In 2017, Loring was named the first Artistic Director for Indigenous Theatre at the National Arts Centre in Ottawa.

he title and location of Where the Blood Mixes comes from the town of Kumsheen, the place where the Thompson and the Fraser Rivers meet. A more accurate translation is "the place inside the heart where the blood mixes." Kumsheen, also known as Lytton, BC, is the heart of the N'laka'pamux Nation, and the Lytton First Nation.

On June 30th, 2021 the town of Lytton, the Lytton First Nation, and the surrounding area were devastated by a wildfire that ripped through the entire community following three consecutive days of the hottest temperatures ever recorded in Canada. Within a matter of minutes over 90% of the town was destroyed.

This is the first time this play has been produced since the wildfire. We bring this work to life with care and with the thoughts of the thousands of people who lost their homes and their community, including playwright Kevin Loring. Kevin described how he saw the house he grew up in and his hometown in flames, throughout videos circulating online. "The first 10 seconds, it's my house. It's the house I grew up in. It's on repeat," said Loring.



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






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
